

Impact of Government Cutbacks

Many of you have been following the news of pending cuts in health care reimbursement both in New Jersey and nationally. We need your help in reaching out to your State Senators and Assemblywomen/men to express your concern as to the effect these cuts will have on our elderly. Below is a suggested letter which can be used as a guide for communicating with your legislators. This process is being carried out across the State of New Jersey by the Boards of Directors, and families and friends of the non-profit health care industry, which is the only way that we will effect some reconsideration of these cuts.

Governor Christie has directed the Legislature to enact major cuts in State funding to Medicaid programs serving seniors, and this has been included in the FY 2012 State Budget. The largest and most devastating cut contained in the proposal reduces payments to the Jewish Home at Rockleigh by 6%. The annual cost of this cut is \$357,508. This amounts to \$12.21/day/resident. In addition, another cut has already been made by not paying nursing homes to hold a resident's bed open for the 10 days required to hold it when the resident leaves a facility for a hospital stay. This is an additional loss of \$40,000/year.

Another impact is that every State Medicaid dollar cut results in a loss of an additional dollar in Federal matching funds. Thus, the total impact of the proposal is doubled. As you can imagine, such reductions in funding will seriously jeopardize the fiscal well-being of the Jewish Home at Rockleigh and undermine our continued efforts to provide high quality care to our elderly and your constituents.

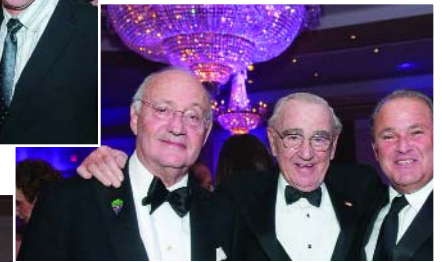
New Jersey continues to hold the unenviable distinction of maintaining one of the largest discrepancies between what we spend to care for our elderly residents in nursing homes and what Medicaid actually reimburses providers. In the case of the Jewish Home at Rockleigh, the difference between our cost/day and the Medicaid reimbursement is \$148.60/day or a total of \$4,351,000/year.

Your assistance in restoring the Medicaid funding for seniors in the FY 2012 State Budget is critical to ensuring access to these services for our frailest, poorest and oldest citizens who cannot be cared for in any other setting.

How would you like to relive your school days without grades or tests? The year also ends with a graduation and prom. Sounds like a fantasy, but it's not. It's the Jewish Home University at the Jewish Home at Rockleigh which offers lifelong learning on topics such as the World of Yiddish, Investing in Bonds, History of Jews in the Military, and much more.

Started in September, the University provides residents with weekly thought-provoking classes which stimulate the mind. Every Thursday, residents gather in the second floor social hall to learn about exciting topics. The instructors are professionals in their field of expertise and welcome questions and participation from the residents.

JoAnn Hassan Perlman chairs a Committee of the Board of Directors which has been instrumental in finding guest lecturers to present on topics such as reviews of films, international politics, Jewish journalism and politics, and fashion. According to JoAnn, "it is our hope to intellectually stimulate and enrich the lives of

our residents by offering a series of courses on a regular basis." Board Member Carl Epstein recently provided a lecture on the History of Jews in the Military. The Yavneh Academy has opened their computer laboratory to our residents for their use in learning basic computer skills. Our residents are most interested in learning how to shop online.

Residents have been instrumental in helping develop the curriculum and suggested several of the courses. Marilyn Wechter has commented that she has gotten a kick out of doing homework at her age. Not all of the residents agree with these sentiments though, and some prefer to stick with the classwork.

These sources not only keep your mind active, but they open doors to subjects you thought were closed off. They make good conversation topics for talks with grandchildren, family and friends, especially through e-mail and Skype.

The University runs from September to June, culminating in a prom, graduation, and best of all, great pride in accomplishment.

When Seniors May Need Help - Jewish Home at Home Identifies Eight Important Warning Signals

Our relationships with our family members, neighbors and friends are critical to us. This is especially true as loved ones age. Sometimes the emotional attachment we have with our loved ones leads us to minimize observed change in behavior, mood or memory. It is easy to dismiss an unusual situation by thinking it's an isolated incident and that the person is just having a bad day. It's hard to perceive a problem that has developed gradually over time. We are invested in believing that the parent, uncle, cousin or friend is fine. It is natural to want them to remain as they have always been—capable, strong, energetic, a good cook, handyman, life of the party, etc. Accepting that the person you care so much about truly is having problems handling day-to-day tasks is difficult. We worry that raising our concerns might cause them to feel insulted, embarrassed, defensive, angry or sad.

There is no general formula for aging. Everyone ages in his or her own way and in his or her own time. What we suggest is that both the seniors and the people close to them be knowledgeable about the eight warning signals that may indicate the senior needs some assistance. Too often we wait for an emergency to occur before we recognize the risks. If we stay alert to the warning signals, solutions can be put into place before a crisis occurs, instead of after.

The mission of the Jewish Home at Home is to help keep seniors safe and at home for as long as possible. JH@H provides the professional expertise of a Geriatric Care Manager who is trained to identify the seniors' strengths and also their risks. Recommendations can be made that lead to a plan of care—a road map that can allow seniors to remain at home with the care and services necessary to maximize their safety, independence and quality of life.

Be aware of the Eight Warning Signals and avert a possible crisis:

- Poor nutrition and weight loss** — Is there food in the refrigerator? Is any food spoiled? Has your mother lost her appetite?
- Self neglect** — Poor hygiene and grooming, stained clothing, house in disarray, unclean, or cluttered.
- Increased frailty** — Multiple hospitalizations, repeated falls, fatigue.
- Change in mood or behavior, social isolation** — Is your father no longer interested in his favorite sports team? Does your mother prefer not to leave the house? Is he irritable? Does she often become tearful?
- Forgetfulness and confusion** — Repetitious questions and stories, telephone calls at odd hours, frequently misplacing things, skipped appointments, unopened mail, driving tickets or reports of car accidents.
- Problems with medication** — No longer understands what medications she takes, does not take medications regularly, does not refill prescriptions, refuses to take medication.
- Difficulty handling finances** — Are bills left unpaid? Are vendors overcharging for services? Is your father purchasing unnecessary items?
- Limited availability of family caregiver** — Loss of spouse, children living out of town, family caregivers with competing responsibilities that make them unavailable.

Two Agencies Team Up to Respond to a Family's Needs

Recently the Jewish Home at Home reached out to Bonim Builders, a core program of the Synagogue Leadership Initiative and a department of the Jewish Federation of Northern New Jersey, on behalf of a family that was facing a traumatic event.

Mrs. Rosemary Pellecchia, age 64, suffered a stroke that resulted in aphasia and an inability to ambulate. Aphasia is a communication disorder that impairs the ability to verbally express oneself (expressive aphasia) and/or comprehend what is being said (receptive aphasia). Mrs. Pellecchia was admitted to the Jewish Home at Rockleigh's Sub-Acute Rehabilitation Center for physical, occupational and speech therapy. Over the weeks and months she made significant progress. Prior to this illness, Mrs. Pellecchia lived with her husband, Anthony, in a center hall colonial—a place that required several modifications if she was going to be able to return home.

JH@H's mission is to provide the professional expertise and services needed so that seniors can live at home safely with the highest quality of life. In order to help Mrs. Pellecchia return home as she wished, Susan Lilly, JH@H's Director

of Geriatric Care Management Services contacted Stacey Orden, Bonim Coordinator. Since it was not clear when the medical insurance company would order the discharge, it was important that the modifications to the house be done quickly. The house had to be ready when Mrs. Pellecchia returned home.



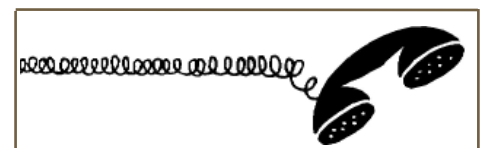

Bonim Builders understood the urgency and responded. Stan Mandelkem, Bonim Chairperson telephoned JH@H and then contacted Mr. Anthony Pellecchia the very same day. Within the week, the home was evaluated and a plan was formulated. Wrought iron railings were measured and installed leading from the garage to the kitchen, and another two rails were installed on the steps inside the kitchen. Bathroom modifications were made and the banister with new brackets was re-installed.

After three weeks, the home was ready for Mrs. Pellecchia's discharge. This was a remarkably quick response to the family's pressing needs. The joint efforts of the JH@H and Bonim Builders made the unsettling transition back home smoother and safer. This is a clear example of *Tikkun Olam* and the power of two sister agencies joining together to get the job done.
