Fighting The COVID-19 Battle

Dear friends,

We have been fighting the battle against COVID-19 for the better part of a year. In elder care, we have felt like the foot soldiers in this war, slogging our way through difficult and

treacherous terrain in search of victory. We've had to scrounge and struggle for our weaponry, with no help and few resources. And there have been times when the fight seemed unwinnable. But we persevered and found ways to succeed, to save lives and to keep our elders safe.



Now there is a new and powerful weapon in this fight and it comes in the form of a simple shot in the arm. The Jewish Home at Rockleigh was one of the first long term care organizations in the State of New Jersey to receive vaccines. We had our first clinic on December 28 and our second on January 18. There is one more

clinic scheduled that will take place on February 8. Jewish Home Assisted Living had their first clinic on January 16 with their second on February 6 and third on February 27.

Why these dates? We were required by the New Jersey Department of Health to work with a pharmacy partner on the vaccination program. We had a choice of CVS or Walgreens and we chose CVS. The pharmacy sets the clinic dates and they bring in all of the staff, along with all of the supplies necessary to conduct single day mass vaccination programs.

We have made a very concerted effort to get the majority of our staff and elders vaccinated. We held Zoom meetings for families and elders, Town Hall meetings for elders and then had numerous





small group meetings of staff on both campuses, all shifts. After two clinics at the Jewish Home at Rockleigh, we were able to vaccinate more than 90% of our elders and 75% of our staff. After one clinic at Jewish Home Assisted Living, we vaccinated every elder who was able to receive the vaccine and 67% of the staff. We hope to get over 75% of the staff at the second clinic.



We will also be offering the vaccine to Essential Caregivers at the second Assisted Living clinic. Essential Caregiver is a role defined by the State that enables a family member to visit with a loved one inside the building for two hours/week. To qualify, the family member must fill out an application and submit it to the organization for approval. We are able to vaccinate one Essential Caregiver per family and are glad to have that opportunity.

The vaccine is not the total solution, we all know that. But it is a huge step forward for all of us. We must still remain cautious. Masks are still going to be with us along with social distancing and handwashing. We have come too far, and fought too hard, to let down our guard now. We all look forward to the day when life returns to normal and COVID becomes a memory.

Paul Kaplan, The Jewish Home Foundation's Senior Development Associate, has earned the prestigious Certified Fundraising Executive designation, the only accredited, globally recognized certification for fundraising professionals. More than 7,200 fundraising professionals from over 20 countries are currently CFREs.

To earn the CFRE certification, fundraising professionals must meet education, professional practice and professional

performance requirements, pass a rigorous comprehensive exam on best practices in ethical fundraising, and a test that they abide by the International Statement of Ethical Principles in Fundraising, as well as the laws governing fundraising practice.

Paul joined the Jewish Home Foundation in 2018 with a very strong and successful development background. He holds a business degree from East Carolina University, a Master's degree from Penn State and a Certificate in Non-Profit Fundraising from Yeshiva University. He and his wife Elissa reside in Wayne with their four children.

Did You Know?

The Jewish Home Family has administered 29,800 Covid-19 tests to staff at a cost of \$1.7 Million.

160,000 pieces of Personal Protective Equipment were purchased by The Jewish Home Family at an unbudgeted expense of \$700,000.

In order to provide virtual visits to keep residents and families connected, \$14,400 of electronic equipment was purchased in the last 12 months.

The Covid-19 crisis resulted in 42,000 additional nursing staff hours at a cost of \$840,000.

The Jewish Home Family experienced reduced admissions and early safe discharges due to the pandemic resulting in lost revenue of \$6.7 Million.

Special sanitizing equipment and chemicals purchased during the Covid-19 crisis has cost The Jewish Home family \$108,982.

The Jewish Home Family has provided free meals to staff throughout the pandemic as a source of respite and relief at a cost of \$80,000.

As of February 27th, the Jewish Home was able to supply vaccines to 90% of the elders and 75% of the Jewish Home at Rockleigh Staff, 100% of the elders and 67% of staff at Jewish Home Assisted Living.

Second Century Project Construction Moving Along

Since last February, work on the Jewish Home Second Century Project has continued unabated on the Rockleigh campus. The construction continues at a significant pace, with completion scheduled for the early Fall 2021.

The facility will include a new 43 thousand sq.ft., 60 bed short-term rehabilitation facility that will offer hospitality elements such as all private rooms with showers, laundry facilities for patient and family use, areas that

offer a variety of dining options, outdoor therapy courtyards, and warm water therapy.

The project is being financed thru a \$30MM Capital Campaign, that has to date raised \$26MM funded by the community.

Jewish Home Assisted Living's Avi Feld Mashgiach of the Year

Avi Feld has been celebrated and appreciated by the staff and residents of the Jewish Home Family for many years but it was especially gratifying to learn that he was nominated by the Rabbinical Counsel of Bergen County (RCBC) and chosen as the 2020 Mashgiach of the Year by *Kashrus Magazine*, a national publication.

The publication stated, "Mr. Feld combines the unique blend of dedication to strict kosher standards with the ability to lead the kitchen staff in a positive environment which he creates."

Avi has worked for the Jewish Home Assisted Living since 2007. He holds a BS in Marketing from Touro College and an Assisted Living Administrator License as well. He has years of experience working with high-end caterers which is evident in everything he does. Avi says his position at the Jewish Home allows him to combine his love of religion and his love of food. He refers to his programs as "Food for the Soul." He says "I'm driven by the elders'

reactions to my programs. I have to live up to their expectations."

He spoke about his experience working in his role as Mashgiach in healthcare on site during COVID. He said he was honored to work alongside his colleagues like Julie Cochrane who included him in the outreach to the elders. He said as a creative person he felt blessed to have the opportunity to share in the brainstorming

sessions in an effort to bring quality of life to our elders who were confined to their rooms during those unprecedented times.

Avi has also been bringing joy to elders who have been confined to their homes in the community as the host of "Cooking for Happiness," a Community Outreach program



that goes out from the Jewish Home to the greater community via Zoom.

When asked about receiving this national award, Avi said "I'm truly honored. I hope to continue this work. It's an honor to represent the RCBC and an honor to represent The Jewish Home Family."

Keeping Dementia at Bay

Neurosurgeon Sanjay Gupta, MD, is a familiar face as CNN's chief medical correspondent. He's become even more familiar of late with the publication of his new book "Keep Sharp: Build a Better Brain at Any Age," which was published collaboratively with AARP. While this is largely a book about how we can help ourselves to stave off dementia, as

you might expect as a neurosurgeon, the first part of the book is about the science of your brain and fascinating material in its own right.

The core of this book is about dementia and Dr. Gupta talks about the "ways the brain begins to break," which include genetics but also other disorders. The key thing, though,

is that Dr. Gupta believes that dementia is not inevitable and that there are real measures we can take to keep cognitive impairment at bay.

He proposes that all of us try a 12-week long "sharp brain" program that has a number of elements any of us can try. Some of them probably come to mind immediately like exercise, healthy eating and sleep. Others are things we might not have considered like a bedtime routine, regular relaxation, yoga and maintaining ongoing social connections. One of the really interesting suggestions is that everyone maintain a gratitude journal.

What's a gratitude journal? It's a way for us to capture, ideally every day, those things for which we are grateful. It's an exercise we have done with elders and one that really can make a difference. Spending a few moments to think about what really matters to us can help to refocus us, direct our attention to what matters and even influence our behavior going forward.

As we create our own healthy lives, physically and emotionally, it doesn't just help us fight dementia. It also helps inspire others to do the same and enriches the relationships in our lives. It's a good reminder that all aspects of our health are truly in our hands.

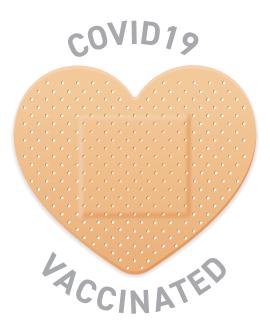
